Monitoring the work of Social Care Units: year 2021

The Hellenic Statistical Authority (ELSTAT) announces the data of the Survey on Social Care Units (legal entities of public law), for the year 2021. The survey is carried out every two years and aims at collecting non-financial data of these units, such as data on their personnel, as well as the number of persons hosted by the units or receiving their services (beneficiaries).

The 2021 survey comprises the 12 Regional Centers of Social Welfare (KKPP), established by the law 4109/2013, with each of them representing a Legal Entity of Public Law. Every Regional Center of Social Welfare is comprised of branches and sub-branches which from now on will be called Social Care Units for the purposes of the survey. The units in 2021 came up to 55, compared to 54 in 2019 (Table 1).

In addition, in the survey are included 3 legal entities of public law with their 10 branches as total under the inspection of the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs which are the National Center of Social Solidarity (EKKA) having 6 branches, the National Foundation for the Deaf (EIK) having 2 branches and the Training and Rehabilitation Center for the Blind (KEAT) with also 2 branches (Table 1).

Moreover, another 13 legal entities of public law are included of which 10 are under the management of Municipalities (8 nursing homes and 2 orphanages) and the Juvenile Protection Company under the inspection of Ministry of Justice with three branches which host children (2 in Attiki and 1 in Kriti). The Municipal institutions offer similar services with the units of KKPP to the same groups (long term/disabled/elderly and minors). As for the 3 public entities mentioned above (EKKA, EIK, KEAT) they protect vulnerable groups as homeless, victims of violence and various forms of discrimination or offer training and help disabled people in the context of rehabilitation and reintegration to the society (Table 1).

In the other public units, a decrease was observed in the beneficiaries of the in-patient care while beneficiaries of the out-patient care and the persons employed increased (Table 2).



More specifically the persons employed in the Social Care Units of the Regional Centers of Social Welfare (KKPP) in 2021, presented a small decrease of 0.6% compared to 2019, due to the reduction of 6.8% in the Units of Long Term Care. In the Public units the personnel were increased by 23.2% (Table 3, Graph 1).




The number of beneficiaries of in-patient care services of KKPP in 2021 amounted to 2,205 compared to 2,322 in 2019 presenting a decrease of 5.0%, while in the other units the number of in-patient beneficiaries amounted to 589 in 2021 compared to 685 in 2019 presenting a decrease of 14.0 % (Table 4, Graph 2).

Graph 2. Beneficiaries of in-patient care in Social Care Units for the years 2019 and 2021 per unit category




The out-patient beneficiaries of KKPP (in regular basis) in 2021 amounted to 616 against 791 in 2019 presenting a decrease of 22.1% where in the other public entities there was an increase of beneficiaries by 14.1% i.e. from 405 in 2019 to 462 in 2021 (Table 5 Graph 3).




Further analysis of beneficiaries by gender shows a percentage higher for women (females 51.4%, males 48.6%). In most age groups a higher percentage of men is presented and only in the age group over 80 years the majority are women (74.2%). The age group of 18-44 years is the one with the highest percentage of 27.5% of the total. In particular, the out-patient care decreases significantly in those over 65 years of age, while the in-patient care increases significantly for the elderly over 80 years of age (Table 6, Graphs 4 & 5)



Graph 4. Beneficiaries by age group and gender, for in-patient and out-patient care in Social Care Units for the year 2021




Graph 5. Beneficiaries of in-patient and out-patient care of Social Care Units by age group in the year 2021




In 2021, for the total of the Units, the 51.2% of the beneficiaries received care by the units lasting up to 5 years. Specifically to the 72.2% of them was provided in-patient care and to the 27.8% outpatient care. As the length of protection rises the percentage of beneficiaries is reduced up to 19.1% for over 18 years of care (Table 7, Graph 6).

Table 7. Number of beneficiaries by length of stay/care in Social Care Units for the year 2021






The region of Attiki provides services with the highest number of beneficiaries and personnel, followed by Kentriki Makedonia and Kriti. It should be noticed that the region of Peloponnisos does not have any unit and Dytiki Makedonia only one. The highest number of persons employed are recorded for the rest of personnel (administrative, technical and catering staff, e.tc.) followed by medical and nursing staff and scientific staff (psychologists, social workers, physical therapists) (Table 8, Graphs 7,8).



EXPLANATORY NOTES

Purpose of the Survey The Survey on Social Care Units monitors, at a biennial basis, the number of on Social Care Units Social Care Units all over Greece. It is a census survey aiming at collecting nonfinancial data concerning the Social Care Units that operate as Legal Entities of Public Law. As Legal Entities of Public Law are considered those entities of which the purpose is to serve and accomplish a certain state function or public service, are founded by the state and undertake duties and rights independently on legal basis (they have independent legal capacity). Typical legal entities of public law are the Local Government Organizations (municipalities and regions), the Greek Orthodox Church, the National Center of Social Solidarity (EKKA), the National Foundation for the Deaf (EIK) and the Training and Rehabilitation Center for the Blind (KEAT), the last three are under the supervision of the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs. Moreover by the articles 102 & 103 of the Law 3852/2010 is provided for that each municipality is able to constitute or possess up to two legal entities, one in the sector of social protection, solidarity and education and one in the sector of civilization, sports and environment as it is provided for by the Law 3463/2006 article 75.

This survey collects data on the characteristics of the in-patient or out-patient care units, data on their personnel and on the beneficiaries of the units.

- **Legal Framework** The survey is conducted pursuant to the Law 3832/2010, as amended and in force.
- **Reference period** The survey refers to the social care units that were operating on the 31st of December of the reference year.
 - Coverage The survey covers Greece total. The data are collected at the level of the Region (NUTS 2). The Legal Entities of Public Law include: Units of Long Term Care, Units of Recovery and Rehabilitation of people with disabilities, Units for the Protection of Children and other Legal Entities of Public Law to help vulnerable groups. Based on the Law 4025/2011 (Article 1) on the "Reconstruction of the National Social Welfare System", as amended by the Law 4109/2013 (Article 9), the units that used to be Legal Entities of Public Law have merged and are now operating as branches of the new Regional Social Welfare Centers (KKPP), which amount to 12 (one centre per NUTS 2 Region, except for the Region of Peloponnisos). Each Regional Social Welfare Centre encompasses the corresponding units or branches, which are grouped into 3 categories: units for People with Disabilities or Chronic Diseases, units for the Protection of Children and units for the Recovery and Rehabilitation of People with Disabilities. These units take care of persons with disabilities and chronic diseases, nurse elderly, nestle children and juveniles, as well as offer outpatient care to minors having developmental disorders (1 branch) and also offer rehabilitation services to disabled. In this group of units (i.e. KKPP) has been included one unit which previously belonged to the Center of Social Welfare of Sterea Ellada and runs independently now as a Long Term Nursing Home, for comparison reasons of the time series. The rehabilitation services previously provided by the Centers for Recovery and

Physical and Social Rehabilitation (KAFKA) and the Centers for Education, Social Support and Training for the Disabled (KEKYKAMEA) were transferred to the public hospitals of the National Health System and are now provided through the

Centers for Physical and Medical Rehabilitation (KEFIAP). After this change, the units reduced from 95 in period 2007-2011 to 58 in year 2013. Moreover, three independent institutions EKKA, EIK and KEAT under the supervision of the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs, 9 municipal institutions in the form of nursing homes and orphanages, as well as the Juvenile Protection Company under the supervision of Ministry of Justice are also investigated.

- Methodology The survey is a census survey covering all the Social Care Units and records the in-patient and out-patient welfare services provided by the State. Definitions
 - <u>Out-patient care</u> means care services provided to adults or minors who need help; these services are provided in a specific facility that operates specific hours during the day (excluding overnight stay), e.g., provision of day care services to children whose family cannot fulfill their parental role on account of economic or other reasons.
 - <u>In-patient care</u> means the care services provided to vulnerable population groups who stay on a permanent or provisional basis in a specific facility (institution, unit), which covers, firstly, their basic needs (shelter, food) and, secondly, their sentimental or psychological social needs, e.g. children cities, homes for the elderly, etc.
 - <u>Personnel</u> include all the persons employed in the social care units including permanent personnel and those working under contract of limited or unlimited duration.
 - <u>Beneficiaries</u> are the people who are entitled to receive material and psychological care services provided by the Social Care Units.
